

Declaration

State of New Jersey,

Warren County, On this twelfth day of October in
the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and thirty two personally
appeared in open court before the judges of the Inferior Court
of Common Pleas now sitting, Isaac Robins a resident of the
Township of Knowlton in the County of Warren and State of
New Jersey aged seventy four years, who being first duly sworn
according to law, doth on his oath make the following declara-
tion in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th A.D. 1832.—

That he was born on the twenty ninth day of June in the
year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and fifty eight
in the Township of Amwell in the County of Hunterdon
that the record of his age is now in his possession in the hand
writing of his father.— That he lived with his father in the
Township of Knowlton in the County of Sussex, (now Warren)
when he entered the service; that he has lived in the said
Township of Knowlton ever since the Revolutionary war, excepting
four years, which time he lived in the adjoining Township of
Hardwick, and he still lives in the said Township of Knowlton.
That he entered into the service of the United States as a private
in the Continental Militia of the Revolutionary War sometime
in the fall of the year seventeen hundred and seventy six; the
Militia of New Jersey were clapped in the Revolutionary War
and were ordered into the service in succession according to
their respective numbers. Deponent was first ordered out for
one month and served that length of time at Elizabeth town
under Captain John Smith in Col. John Taylor's Regiment Gen^t
Maywell's Brigade. Deponent was next ordered out in February
seventeen hundred and seventy seven for one month under
Capt William Nyce but was detained six weeks before he
was released, during which time he served in the vicinity
of Bound Brook, the British then occupying New Brunswick,
he was obliged to go every other day seven miles to stand on
the Picket guard, and when off that duty he was laboring
at erecting a fortification around the Meeting house at that
place; he was in one partial engagement while there,
and was during this tour under the same Colonel and General
above named— Afterwards in May of the last mentioned year
Deponent went as a substitute for his father and served under

Captain William Nye, was served one month at Bound Brook. Daniel Vaughn was his Lieutenant. Afterwards in the same year, month not recollect, he was again ordered out and served one month at Bound Brook, under Capt Peter Wolf. — Afterwards in the same year, month not recollect, but directly after his return from the last mentioned tour he served under Captain George Ribble on the frontier along the Delaware River one month. — Afterwards in the same year, month not recollect, he was ordered out and served one month under Capt Abraham Bescherer in the vicinity of Amboy the British then occupying Amboy and Staten Island. — Afterwards in the same year, month not recollect, he was ordered out and served one month under Capt William Nye on the frontier along the Delaware River in the County of Sussex, and immediately after he served two months at the same place under the same Captain, one month as a substitute for his father and one month as a substitute for his cousin Andrew Robins; Colonel Rosencrantz and Major Westbrook commanded the Militia there stationed. — The Militia to which Deponent belonged were clasped by order of General Maxwell and when on duty this deponent served under the Officers, and at the places severally above named. —

At the close of the year seventeen hundred and seventy seven Deponent enlisted with a team of four horses for the term of six months, under Captain John Hazlett and served in Pennsylvania, Maryland and Delaware during that time, was discharged at Valley Forge, and immediately enlisted again for one year under the same Captain William Biddle was his Colonel. & In about a month after the last term expired he again enlisted for six months under Captain Henry Silcox, his Major's name was Gordon, and he served part of the last mentioned time in New Jersey and part in New York; he was in this tour at Poughkeepsy, Kings Ferry and other places he does not now recollect in the State of New York, he was discharged at Kings Ferry. Immediately after he was discharged he was pressed by Major Johnson and was kept in the service two months longer, within which time he was ordered to, and went to Middlebrook, Trenton and once to Boston and back to Trenton by the way of New Windsor, he was discharged at Trenton early in the year

seventeen hundred and eighty. Afterwards in the month of October in the last mentioned year he was ordered out in his town as a militia man and served six weeks on the frontier along the Delaware River under Captain William Mackey. - Deponent got written discharges in several instances, but they are now lost. - He has no documentary evidence of his aforesaid service, and knows of no person whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service. - ~~There is no Klingman living in his neighborhood.~~ He is known to Benjamin Kilkendall and Jacob Beck in his present neighborhood who can testify to his character for veracity and their belief of his services as a soldier of the Revolution. - He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the Pension Roll of the agency of any state.


