inciently money may be received for the payment thereof And all and singular
the remainder of my Estate and debts and ready money not before given
and bequeathed my debts and legacies being paid and funerall expences be
performed I do give bequeath and devise unto my kinsman William Crith
whom I ordaine to substitute and make sole Executor of this my last will and

our the said Thomas Lake made and declared the day and yeare first above written as touching the disposition of all my lands Tenements and hereditaments what soever. In the first place I doe give and bequeath unto my loving wife Philadelphia All my said lands Tenements and hereditaments To have and to hold unto her and to her assigns for by and during the tyme and terme of her naturall life in Trust to and for her owne and ~~her~~ childrens maintenance and education as shalbe my wife from tyme to tyme shall direct and appoint for which end and intent I doe give and bequeath unto my wife the Couardianship and education of all my Children And doe wish all my Children to be obedient and dutifull unto their mother and to be ruled and advised by her in all matters - which I am confident will have a true toordall motherlike care and affection towards them And will be carefull to advise them both for the good of their soules and bodies Alsoe I doe will and devise unto my sonne Thomas after the decease of my wife Philadelphia All that perrypall messuagge or Tenement wherein I doe now inhabill and dwell together with all the Barnes Stables edifices - buildings And severall pottes and parcells of meadow Ordrable pasture and woodland with the same now used or enjoyed now in my tenure and occupatours And alsoe all that messuagge or Tenement our barne our Orchard our Garden and two pottes or parcells of land situate lying and being together nigh unto a certain wood called Sudham wood And fforre other pottes of land All which last mentioned messuagge or Tenement lands and premises are now or late were in the tenure or occupation of George Weldith or of his assignes assigns And alsoe all that my messuagge and severall pottes of land situate and lying att or neare Comborne in the severall tenures of me and Thomas Weldith formerly by me purchased of fairway To have and to hold unto my sonne Thomas And to the heires Males of his body lawfully to be begotten And for default of such heires the Remaunders thereof unto my sonne Arthur And to the heires Males of his body lawfully to be begotten And for default of such heires the remainder thereof unto my right heires for ever. The residue of all my messuagges lands Tenements and hereditaments situate lying and being in Southwist aforesaid (excoes Ordfstow Dunsyale and prachorne in the said County of Kent or else where) I doe give bequath and devise unto and amongst my Children Arthur Anne and Philadelphia To have and to hold unto them my said younger Children and their heires for ever equally to be divided between them Upon this trust and confidence that if it shall please God to send me any more Children or Child that the same Child or children may proportionably and equally inheritt and have the like share and proportion out of the same last mentioned lands and Tenements as any of the other younger Children have or shall have by the intention of this my will. Moreover notwithstanding I doe hereby declare my will and mind to be that if my wife or her brother S^r Thomas Lake Baronett shall at any tyme hereafter content it reasonable that my before mentioned messuagge -

And two peeces of land, which adjoining thereto together
with the said Barn orchard and lands all lying together, which
I askam aforesaid lately purchased by me of Hairway and Merchant
that any other of my Merchants lands and Tenements at any time
hereafter purchased by me shall be sold for the better and more convenient
paying of the portions of my said younger children or for the more
convenient discharging and paying of the children of Edward Hairway late
deceased the monies which hereafter shall become due or payable respect-
tively unto them I do hereby declare my will and mind to be that either my
wife or I Thomas Piers shall make sale of so much of my said lands
(excepting all those lands and Tenements which were formerly my fathers)
as they or any of them shall conceive most fitt for what price or prices
that may be reasonably procured to the intent for the raising of such
summe and summes of monies whereby the said monies due and payable as
aforesaid may be discharged according to the intent of the last will of the
said Edward Hairway and this my will also I do by this my will revoke
and disannul all other wills by me formerly made. I doe will that my wife
shall give unto the said I Thomas Piers a Ring of Gold of Twenty Shillings
price to be worn in remembrance of me desiring him to accept of this small
Mite of my great affection towards him. In witness of this my last
will and Testament I have written this whole will with my own hand and
have subscribed my name and sett my seal the day and year first before

Whereas, I bond was entered into by me many years since unto
Mr. Francis Bottrham conditioned for the assurance of some Liveryhood upon
the children of my brother and sister Bottrham late deceased the same was
voluntarily entered into by me unto the said Francis in Trust for the said
children for this intent surely for the procurement of my said brother
Henry Bottrham to consent that his then lands in Quinny Marsh should
stand liable for the discharge of such monies which he should be bound of
me and I should stand liable to pay or stand chargeable with for or in
respect of him or his children And that the residue should be divided amongst
the children as by severall agreements under the seal of the said lands and sealed
of the said Henry and of Elizabeth his wife it may appear. Unto the which
for the more certainty I do referre my selfe for that the said bond in pursu-
ance of the said trust was swallowed up in the said agreement of which I
formerly acquainted many years since the said Francis who was well satis-
fied and contented And in pursuance of this trust and agreement great
severall summes of monies unto the said Henry And have paid and lent
severall summes of money unto and for the use of his children And upon the
Marriage of my daughter who married my Nephew Kilborne she was paid
by consent of father mother and her selfe fifty pounds in full of her
portion and never any thing spoken of or expected for the children. But that
for which the said Marsh land was secured And in reality and justice by
this my last expressions I declare that it was never intended or declared
that the said bond should be any wayes made use of to be put in justice but surely
to be a motive to induce my brother Bottrham to provide for his children
some thing before he spent all. All these Mr. Francis Bottrham well knows
and it is truthfull have bene a faithfull steward for my brother Bottrham
and his children And am sure have bene a great loser in regard of

Those distracted tymes I was forgetfull to tell in my Bead
 which had been distraction for me to hand down, & I had but spoken for it
 in the life tyme of my brother and sister Petterham the delivery up of that
 would not had been refused but now indifferently and freely - and -
 advantage is rationally endeavored to be made upon hopes that I may
 in short tyme dye or at least may faile in the proofe of the said trust this
 I thought good to publish for Mortalityes sake that I have performed the
 trust of that Bond to all intenty and purposes and to the satisfaction of the said
 ffrauncis about ten years since Although now these matters are forgotten
 or at least were pretended to be forgotten by the said ffrauncis this I thought
 good to publish this sixteenth of October One Thousand Six hundred Sixty
 Six I did likewise that I did interline that in my will as touching my lands
 at Hambourg, written hereunto Sherr Bells

 of his bond of one hundred pounds whereof he hath paid ten pounds And
 I release to M^r wads worth of Lancashire five pounds of the principall
 money of one hundred pounds which he owes me And I will that he give
 that five pounds to the Gentleman for whom the money was borrowed
 And I give to my Goddaughter Dorothy Jane five pounds And to my daughter
 bands Nephew Bartholomew ten shillings And to M^r Elin and her
 two sonnes to every of them ten shillings a peece And to Mary for ten
 shillings And to my Cousin John Ethridge the younger his sonne
 fourty shillings And to my two Cosens Anne and Mary Countess each
 ten shillings a peece for the care they have had of me And I will that my
