





that she was married under the name of Mary Pleasant, to said George Lake, on the Second, day of January, A. D. 1802 by Rev. Jas. Nassau, at Tyngton House, in Boston, Mass., there being no legal barrier to such marriage; that her said husband died at Yankee Cavalry Co. Maryland, on the Fifth, A.
