There is a slight mistake in the Douglas write up as to where the children of the second wife of J. R. P. Garrison were born; they were all, with the exception of the youngest, Spencer Weart, born in New Jersey. There is another mistake in the names of Ura Skillman's family. Andrew Garrison should be Andrew Skillman.

John R. P., or "Captain" Garrison, as he was usually called, was married very young. Born February 4th, 1796, and married December 22nd, 1812—a mere boy of seventeen. His father kept what was then called a "country store," and John being the only boy in the family, was started out early in life; drove a four-horse team and hauled goods from Philadelphia, a distance of thirty miles, when he was but eight years old. He was a soldier and captain of a company; but it is not definitely known in what war he served; perhaps in the latter part of the "War of Twelve." As the president of the United States issued his proclamation on the 19th of June, 1812, declaring war against Great Britain, he may have been too young to have entered that service, and served later on. Be that as it may, he received a "Land Warrant" and got forty acres of government land; laid his "claim" in the hill country of Bartholomew county, Ind.

After his first wife died he married Martha Titus, daughter of Joseph Titus, of near Pennington, N. J.: said Martha Titus had three brothers, Samuel, Jonathan and Smith; and three sisters, Sarah, Hannah and Elizabeth. Sarah married Elias Hart, of Trenton,
