the U. S. navy some time during the year 1901 and is still in the service of his country.

Sarah M. Garrison married William J. Hubbard, an eastern man. He was born and raised in New Haven, Conn. He was a fruit grower and conducted a nursery in Columbus, Ind., for a great many years. Sarah and William had four children, two girls and two boys. The name of the first born was Alice Cary; second, Howard Garrison. The other two, Edgar Poe and Ella Weart, were twins. Alice C. married James C. Laughlin, of Columbus, Ind., and is the only one now living.

Benjamin B. Garrison married Susan Finley, of Seymour. This couple had four children, named as follows: Minnie, Carry, Lucy and Benjamin. Carry and Lucy are dead. Minnie married William Humes, of Seymour, and they had two children. The first is Garrison and the youngest is Ruth.

Spencer, the youngest child of J. R. P. Garrison, left but one child, a girl, named Lillie Willetta. Her mother was Anna Cutter, of Rockford, Ind. She died when Lillie was but a few months old. Spencer W. was born in Bartholomew county, Ind., and died and was buried at Seymour, Indiana. Here this chapter closes. I have named, with a few exceptions, all of the offspring of John R. P. Garrison by his first two wives, Johannah Sutphin and Martha Titus.

J. R. P. Garrison, with his wife and children by second wife, left New Jersey in the summer of 1839, and emigrated to the state of Ohio, but, not being pleased with the country, did not stay longer than to make a visit with some families who had previously gone there from New Jersey, and he went on still farther west and settled in Bartholomew county, Ind. He landed in the then small town of Columbus, in the month of November, with twenty-five cents in his pocket, having made the entire journey "overland" in a covered wagon. Soon after he "entered land" about

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
