He had two daughters and one son whose name was Robert.

Sarah Weart, third sister of J. R. P. Garrison, raised a large and prosperous family,—seven sons in succession and two daughters, twins. Two of the sons were members of the bar. James, the youngest son, was the last one of the family to marry and leave the old home. He married Jennie Taylor of Philadelphia and moved to Des Moines, Iowa and died there in 1874. He was a member of the bar and, at the time of his death, was secretary of the Iowa state senate. Of the large family of Spencer and Sarah Weart, but three are living, William Alfred of Blawenburg, N. J., Mrs. Ose Holcomb of Hopewell, and Susan, wife of ex-senator Jonathan Blackwell of Trenton, N. J.
