of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

On this ~~first~~ ^{first} day of July 1832, ~~respectfully~~
appears in open Court before the Judges of the Superior
Court of Common Pleas in & for the County of Morris now
sitting at Morris Town in said County Peter - ~~son~~
a resident of Randolph in the County of Morris
and State of New-York, aged upwards of 30 years,
who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath
make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit
of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832,

That he entered the service of the United States, under
the following named official, & served at home & abroad
He was born in the month of August A.D. 1781 in the Township
of Amwell in the County of Hunterdon in this State, and
when a boy under ten years of age, removed to within 3
miles of Flemington in said County, where he resided until
the Spring of A.D. 1807 when he removed to about four
miles above Morris Town in the Township of Randolph
in the County of Morris above said, where he continued to
reside until this time. In the Spring or early part of the
Summer of 1798 he having been previously enrolled on the
Musters Roll of the Militia of that part of the County of
Hunterdon to which he then belonged, and the first time
the Militia of this State were called into service during the
revolutionary War - This defendant entered the service of the
Militia; he thinks by draft, as a private under Capt. ~~Frederick~~
Pray de C. who resided at Flemington above said, the last
defendant knew of him, & under William Chamberlain de
Colonel. And under Cornelius Stout de C. who removed to
the Lake country in the State of New-York Major - the regiment
to which he then belonged organized at ~~Union~~ ^{Union} ~~Union~~
below Flemington above said, and he with the regiment
marched across the Mill Stone river - Somerville, and

through Woodbridge, where they staid about a month
and then crossed to the Brunswick Landing in the
County of Middlesex, and that he & the company to which
he belonged were kept on Staten Island Sound, and the
shore from there to Elizabeth Town in the County of Essex
till as late as he thinks as November 1776; at the time of the
battle on Long Island, he thinks he & his company were
at a place called the Blazing Star, between Elizabeth Town
& Woodbridge aforesaid. The British were on Staten Island
at that time. Sometimes they fired across the sound at the
and the fire back, recollect on night of assisting to
build a small fort near the shore, where his company
were fired at during the night. From there he & his com-
pany went to Round Brook, they staid there about a
month. While there the British came on ~~the~~ by surprise
early one morning & killed two or three of our men.
Gen. Richard Buttrick had the command of the troops
nearly all the time above stated, Col. Chambers then of
Huntingdon likewise commanded him with his associates
during the time above specified; during that time when
Becrain & Chambers had a quarrel & he thinks Chamber-
lain was dismissed from the service. One Capt. Souders
commanded him as captain principally. During that
time his officers were frequently exchanged.
He was discharged by parole at Round Brook immediately
after the prise by the British & returned home where he was
during the battles of Brimton & Princeton. He thinks he was
out at that time about six months. After the battle of
Brimton & Princeton he with a part of the Battalion to
which he belonged were again called out (he thinks by
draft) into the service & were encamped on the Raritan
River in Somerset County for a month, the British then
being in New Brunswick, he supposed there were at least
as two regiments of our men encamped there. Nothing
of special importance occurred except that a party of
our men crossed the river with the rest, for the purpose

of plundering within the British lines when a skirmish
ensued & his party retreated across the river. He then R^d
Chambers - R^d his Colonel when he was out this time
& his Captain and one John Cook fellow - R^d his
Lieutenant, in marching, they they went nearly the same
road they travelled the first time he was out - He was
then again discharged by order & returned home.

Shortly after that appointment was again called on
in the same mode as before stated & continued with
very short intermissions in the service until after the
Battle of Monmouth in June 1778. he was during this time
in the State of New Jersey & nearly all the time on or
near the Raritan River & Staten Island Sound - and
was kept there for the purpose of protecting the surround-
ing Country from the invasion of the Indians & the
depredations of the Enemy & the refugees, who were
numerous at that time in that part of the State -
At the Battle of Monmouth he was on his way there
but did not arrive soon enough to take a part.

At this distance of time he cannot state all the particulars
important that occurred from the time he returned the 20th
Nov^r till he received a discharge for the last time, nor
can he state particularly all the times he was called
into service nor all the officers by whom he was comm-
anded. The officers above stated commanded him
principally during this time. He was at one time
commanded during a month by one Capt Dingley
since death of Chabot from the militia in the part
of the State which he then resided were organized
into two parties or divisions to one of which he belong-
ed & to the other of which his Brother William Fine
belonged and one or the other of which parties were
out in the service from the latter part of Spring 1776
till after the Battle of Monmouth in June or July
1778 nearly all the time. He always acted as a
substitute for his Brother when his Brother was called

or, he don't think his Brother was in the service or
was killed, during this time. His Brother was a few
years ago at defendant's former residence in the County
of Hunterdow. but don't know whether he is now dead or
alive - defendant is inform and his memory impaired -
defendant alleged the whole time he served at such months
Man during the War, Exceeded Eighteen Months in all.
Within the time above specified. He had no record of his
age except he was Episcopalian in a Dutch Church, near
where he resided in Hunterdow County & he supposed that
Church kept some record of the age. He thinks some
of the Elders of that Church had some this record. But
he don't know their names. He thinks Robert Young,
Capt Oliver Corvick, Joseph McCrex, Antin Towbridge
can testify as to his character for truth & veracity.
~~At the place of residence he served refer to Isaac~~
Sake John Richardson, William Sake & John Sake
who he thinks can testify to his character for truth and
veracity and their belief as to his being a Soldier of the
revolution - Defendant was out in the service at all times
when called upon during the revolutionary War -

He hereby relinquished every claim - relative to a pension or
annuity except the present, & declared that his name is not in the
pension roll of the agency of any State, or if any is only
in that of the agency of the State of New York.

I have to advise you from the papers in the
Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 1051, it ap-
pears that Peter Sine was born in August 1751 at
Amwell Township, Hunterdon County, New Jersey.

While residing in said Hunterdon County, he
served from in 1776 until in June 1778, at various
times as a private under Captains Horton Gray, Jones,
and Quigley, Colonels Chamberlain and Chambers in the
New Jersey Troops, he was in an engagement at Bound
Brook and served eighteen months.

He applied for pension July 31, 1832, while a
resident of Randolph Township, Morris County, New
Jersey. The claim was allowed.

He died September 4, 1832, leaving a widow (her
name is not stated), and the following children- John Y.,
