He was born on the fourteenth day  
of April seventeen hundred and  
sixty one in the township of South  
Brunswick aforesaid. his age is  
recorded in his family Bible, which  
he produced in open Court. He re-  
sided where he was born when he en-  
tered the service as a volunteer in  
the militia as a private under  
Captain Aaron Longstreet. Their  
Colonel was David Hays. Their ma-  
jor Scudder. Their General Grant.  
He went first to Poules Hook as a  
substitute for his father for one  
month. he then went to ~~the~~

1. month on his own account to the same place and its neighborhood. at the time the British were in possession of New Brunswick, which he thinks was in the month of June he went another time under the same officers - they marched to Princeton - from there to Pennington - to Lewisburg mountains and then to Steel's Gap - he was selected as one of the scout to find out where the British were. he remembers that William Tarrillburg was one of the militia men, that went with him as a scout our captains were Aaron Longstreet, William Williamson and others - we had a small skirmish with the picked men at mid day when we found, that the British had left New Brunswick and in a few days we were discharged. He recollects that he was one month at Putnam's Army under Captain Longstreet and one month at Red Bank under Captain Peter Perin. He was at the battle of Springfield and at the battle of Monmouth under the command of Captain Joseph Batcock - he remembers that at the battle of Monmouth it was talked about, that General Washington had taken away General Lee's sword. From the battle of Princeton till the making of the peace this applicant was at the command of his

captain, always ready with his mus-  
ket and other accoutrements, but  
at this distant day he is unwill-  
ing to say the precise time he was  
in actual service, but can say  
with perfect truth that he was in  
that service more than two years

## REGULATIONS UNDER THE ACT OF JUNE 7, 1832.

The following regulations have been adopted:  
 This law has been construed to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Staff of the Army, and to include under the terms "Continental Line," "State troops," "militia," and "volunteers," all persons enlisted, drafted, or who volunteered and who were bound to military service but not those who were occasionally employed with the army upon civil contracts, such as Clerks to Commissaries, and to Store Keepers, &c. Teamsters, Boatmen, &c. Persons who served on board of Private Armed Vessels are also excluded from the benefits of the law, as well as persons who turned out as patrols, or were engaged in guarding particular places at night, and were not recognized as being in actual military service.

- Four general classes of cases are embraced in this law:
1. The Regular Troops.
  2. The State Troops, Militia, and Volunteers.
  3. Persons employed in the Naval service.
  4. Indian Spies.

As rolls of the regular troops in the Revolutionary War exist in this Department, all persons, claiming the benefit of this law as officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians or privates, will in the first instance, make application by transmitting the following declaration, which will be made before a Court of Record of the County where such applicant resides. And every Court having by law a seal and Clerk is considered a Court of Record.

## DECLARATION.

Every applicant will produce the best proof in his power. This is the original discharge or commission; but if neither of these can be obtained, the party will so state under oath, and will then procure, if possible, the testimony of at least one credible witness, stating in detail his personal knowledge of the services of the applicant, and such circumstances connected therewith, as may have a tendency to throw light upon the transaction.

If such surviving witness cannot be found, the applicant will so state in his declaration (l) and he will also, whether he produce such evidence or not, proceed to relate all the material facts, which can be useful in the investigation of his claim, and in the comparison of his narrative with the events of the period of his alleged service, as they are known at the Department. Your letter of the 27<sup>th</sup> October last was received. Some time afterwards I do not know how to answer it as you may wish, you state

"In the readjustment of your claim no term of service that is not specifically set forth can be computed, but if that alleged to have been rendered at New Brunswick in 1777 be satisfactorily explained a liberal estimate of amount claimed will be made"

My statement in September last contained such facts as I remembered and know to be correct. I was in 1777 Stationed at Cranbury about 5 months (not New Brunswick as above stated) to the best of my recollection one half of the Militia of our district was on duty a number of my neighbours were there the same length of time, I may have served the alternate months for my father or one of my brothers, but I cannot positively say, I went home on furlough a number of times (about 5 or 6 miles distant) to change my cloths, but I faithfully served that length of time, I am 86 years of age, and would be happy to be restored to such pension as you may think just, before I die, your friend respectfully

Dear Madam:

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S. 818, based upon the Revolutionary War service of John Gulick.

He was born April 14, 1761 in South Brunswick Township, Middlesex County, New Jersey.

While residing in South Brunswick Township, he enlisted in September or October, 1776 and served at various times as a private until the close of the war with the New Jersey troops, under Captains Aaron Longstreet, William Williamson, David Chambers, Stout, Peter Perrine, Joseph Badcock, Oryea and Colonels Jacob Hyer, Scudder, Neilson, Dykins, Vandike, and Frelinghuysen, he was in the battles of Springfield, and Monmouth, and served in all about two years.

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 11, 1832, then a resident of South Brunswick Township, New Jersey.

The soldier's father was living during the Revolution, as he stated that one month of his service was as substitute for his father, his name is not given.

The soldier's wife on February 12, 1847 signed "T. Gulick". There is no further reference to her, and no reference to children.

On the thirtieth day of September, 1840, personally appeared before the undersigned a Justice of the Peace in and for said County, John Felick a resident of South Brunswick in the County of Middlesex and State aforesaid in the Eighty Sixth year of his age who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following additional declaration as required by the Commissioners of pensions in a letter bearing date June 27, 1846 as far as declarant is able viz His first term was under Capt. A. Longstreet Col Hoyer and Lt. Heard in October 1776 or September was stationed at Cowleshook one month, was next sent to Cranberry, the enemy then in New Brunswick, stationed there about five months viz January, February, March, April and May, under Captains Longstreet, Williamson and David Chambers, there were four or five hundred troops at Cranberry, under Col Hoyer Col Scudder Lt. Hecard and others that he does not recollect. Lieutenant Worthon sometimes had charge of the company. In June or July of the same year 1777, the enemy left New York to cross New Jersey, he then was out one month at Sourland Mountain and Stalls Gap, under Capt. Longstreet and Col Scudder. In September 1777, served one month at Elizabethtown under Capt. Stout or Longstreet and Col Scudder there were many companies there at the same time. One month <sup>in November</sup> at Red Bank on the banks of the Delaware below Philadelphia under Capt. Peter Perrine and Col Hoyer or Col Scudder, there were 3 or 400 Regulars and a Brigade of Jersey militia at Red Bank. In 1778 he was out a month thinks it was April at Amboy under Capt. Longstreet and Col Dykman. In June he was out a month under Capt. Babcock of

Somerset County living on the line between the two-  
counties, in 1778 and was at the battle of Monmouth  
under Col Van Dyke, a day or two after the battle was  
discharged having served the month of June out.

Was out a number of other times during that year  
and the year 1779, under Capt. Babcock, Williamson  
and Duryee of Somerset County and Col's Frelightinghouse  
& Van Dyke. In Middlesex County under Captains  
Chambers, Longstreet, Lieut. Messher, Col. Nelson  
Col. Seudder, Major Egbert and some others - at  
Woodbridge, Elizabeth town, Cranbury and other places  
that he cannot recollect.

In June 1780 he served one month under Capt.  
Duryee and Col Frelightinghouse was in the battle of  
Springfield during that month, and other times that  
he cannot specify. In January 1781 he was out  
one month under Capt. Duryee or Babcock of Somerset  
County, it may have been less than one month, it was  
during the revolt of the Pennsylvania line, he cant  
tell or specify the other tours of his during the  
Revolution, nor can he remember what tour was  
set forth in his declaration written by James S. Green  
Esq. of Princeton as it was not required of him to  
state particularly all the service, he is now very  
aged and infirm nearly eighty five years of age and  
all those who were his companions in arms are dead  
not knowing a single one now living, and to "set forth  
distinctly each tour of service" is to ask what no man can  
do at his great age, he may have made some slight  
errors in the foregoing declaration but to the best of his  
recollection and belief they are true, and he further  
declares that from the year 1776 to the close of the war  
he served more than two years active duty during

Said Resolution. declarant knew but one other John Gulick in the Revolution and he drove a team in the Continental Service. He lived part of the time during the Revolution within one mile and a half of Capt. William Jones and about one mile from John Barvian and know perfectly well he was a Sergeant in Capt Jones Company and that he saw much service and was taken prisoner in October 1779. at the same time Dr Ryker, Capt. John Polhemus and my old friend Joseph Hytner with whom I lived at the time he was taken prisoner, they were kept prisoners till next Spring when they came home. John Barvian among them, for whose widow he gave his affidavit. Sworn to and subscribed the day and year above written.
