PHILADELPHIA, October 15. Abstract of an ACT, to enable His Majesty to put the Customs, and other Duties, in the British Dominions in America, and the Execution of the Laws relating to trade there, under the Management of Commissioners to be appointed for that Purpose, and to be resident in the said Dominions: S the officers appointed for the collection of the rates and duties in America, are obliged by 25 Car. II. to apply to the Commissioners of the Cuftoms in England for their special instructions and directions upon every particular doubt and difficulty which arises in relation to the payment of the faid rates and duties; whereby all persons concerned in the commerce and trade of the faid Colonies and Plantations are greatly obstructed and delayed in the carrying on and transacting of their business: And as the appointing of Commissioners to be resident in some convenient part of his Majesty's dominions of America, and to be invested with such powers as are now exercised by the Commissioners of the Customs in England, by virtue of the laws in being, would relieve the faid merchants and traders from the faid inconveniencies and tend to the encouragement of commerce and to the better fecuring of the faid rates and duties, by the more speedy and effectual collection thereof:

It is therefore hereby enacted, that his Majesty be authorised to put the Customs, and other duties in the British Colonies in America, under the management of Commissioners to be resident there, with the fame powers for carrying into execution the laws relating to the revenues and trades of the faid Colonies as are exercised by the Commissioners of the Customs in England: The Crown also is empowered in fuch Commissions, to make provision for the

execution of the faid laws there. All deputations and other authorities, granted by the Commissioners of the Customs of England before the passing of this Act, or granted before any Commission shall be issued in pursuance of this Act, are to be in force there, till revoked by the Treasury.

Abstract of an ACT for restraining and prohibiting the Governor, Council and House of Representatives, of the Province of New-York, until Provision shall have been made for furnishing the King's Troops with all the Necessaries required by Law, from passing or assenting to any Act, Vote or Resolution, for any other Purpose.

THE preamble to this act fets forth, That the province of New-York having, in direct difobedience of the authority of the British Legislature by the acts of 5: 6: and 7 George III. refused to make provision for the necessaries required by those

acts, it is therefore hereby enacted: That from and after the first day of October. 1767, the Governor and Council of New-York are prohibited to pass or affent to any Act of Assembly, or any vote or resolution of the House of Representatives; and the faid House likewise prohibited to pals, or make, any vote or resolution, except for adjournment, until provision be made by them, for furnishing the King's troops with all the necessaries required by the recited acts; and all acts of Assembly, &c. contrary to the tenor hereof, after October 1, 1767, are declared void, except as to the choice and approbation of a Speaker of the House.

BOSTON, October 19

The following is extracted from a Letter wrote by a Gentleman of a public Character, dated Cork, July 7, 767, Which came by a Veffel just arrived.

• T Hope the Situation of our American Provinces is more comfortable fince the Repeal of the fatal Stamp-Act, and I do earnestly pray, that both religious and civil Liberty may be established more firmly among you.

By the public Papers from America I find the Province of New-York have had a new Attempt, &c. and I believe it is intended for all the Provinces, to quarter without the Consent of the present Assemblies, Soldiers upon them. These Impositions, I fear will occasion great Disturbances; but I honor the spirited tho' very modest Answer which the Afferbly of New-York answered the Governor upon the Occasion. By the same Papers I find the Assembly of Pennsylvania have submitted: I am turprized the Assemblies and Provinces do not act in Concert and Unanimity. If once the Government of England can bring over some, I doubt it will not stop till the whole are brought over.

We have a greater scarcity of Provisions of all forts this Year in Ireland, than has been felt for 30 Years past, infomuch that unless we are supplied from America, our Poor will be in great Danger of suffering dreadfully. Our last Crop greatly failed, whereas we find you had a very plentiful one; we have got a few Cargoes of Wheat and Flour, but expect more.

We are apprehensive that we shall be saddled with part of the Crown Debts, next Session of Parliament, which is to meet next Winter, contrary to our Constitutional Rights, which will be very irksome to us, and must be done, if ever done, by Bribery and Corruption in our own Parliament."

Last Thursday, between 10 and 11 o'Clock in the Forenoon, a small Shock of an Earthquake was very fenfibly felt by many Persons in this and the neighbouring towns :- We hear the Shock was very considerable at Piscataqua and the Parts Eastward, about the same time; tho' it seems not of consequence enough to be mentioned in the Portimouth Gazette published the Day following.

Mefficurs EDES and GILD. Find by the last papers the following paragraph under the New-York head, " The Votes that came by the Packet of the Assembly of New-York, gave very great Satisfaction, and the people in general were glad to hear they had so far agreed to furnish the Troops as was intended by Parliament, many of which are to be transported to Ireland." The person who inserted this piece of news I suppose intended to have the reader believe that the affembly of New-York had comply'd with what is called the billeting act as far as was expected of them by the Parliament; and, that if they had not fo done more troops would have been fent to America than are now to be expected; for why elfe are many of them to be transported back to Ireland? The conduct of New-York in this critical affair may be of very great consequence to the rest of the colonies; and therefore it should not be given out to us in such dark hints. I very much question whether New-York has yet comply'd with the act, as feems to have been infifted upon: If I am miltaken, it is easy for you to make the matter certain, and I wish you would get the best intelligence from New-York as foon as may be: That they have and are always ready to grant their Sovereign necessary aid, I make no doubt of; and I shall be very glad if the manner of their furnishing the troops is agreeable to what the parliament intended; provided it be also with

their own free confent, and, without fear or con-Straint—in such a case there never need to be any difference between the Mother Country and America on this head; but if New-York has conceded that the Parliament have a right to prescribe law to them in the case, to leave them only in a manner an executive power, or rather to constitute them fuch, how agreeable foever their concession may be to the intention of the Parliament, they have altogether receded from their first principles; of which the New-York News writer has left us altogether uncertain.

NEW-YORK, October 29. Captain Lawrence spoke an Indiaman, from Madrass and Bengal, the Captain of which informed him, that an Englishman had lately set up for himself in that Part of the World, and had collected

fuch a Banditti together, as to be able to fee both the Mogull, and the English Army in the Field, but that it is thought he would foon be cut off, notwithstanding he was allowed to be an excellent Soldier.

Saturday Night the Ship Christian. Captain Pine arrived here in three Weeks from Antigua: The 17th Instant he fell in with the Snow Muggy, Captain Allison, of and from Philadelphia, bound for Antigua, difmasted and with her fide stove in, which happened in a violent Gale of Wind a few Days before; and the Vessel being a perfect wreck, Captain Allison and his Crew, abandoned her, and have been brought fafe in here by Captain Pine.

The 9th Captain Pine met a schooner from Virginia bound for the West-Indies, that had been in the same Gale, had lost her Main-Mast, and was returning to refit.

Last Thursday Week, the Negro that murdered Teurs, was burnt at Hackinfack, agreeable to his Sentence.

From Hunterdon County in New-Jersey, we learn, that Mr. Daniel Hart, of that Place, was cruelly murdered by his own Negro, on Monday Morning the 12th Instant, in the following Manner, viz. Mr. Hart, called the Negro up to his Work, as usual, which he refused, for which he intended to chastise him; but as soon as Mr. Hart entered the Negro's Room, the Fellow stab'd him in feveral Places with his Knife. Mr. Hart, not expecting, nor being prepared for fuch cruel Treatment, with Difficulty got down Stairs, but was followed by the Negro, where the Villain got an Ax, and dispatched him by a cruel Wound on the Shoulder, and fome other Parts of the Body. The Cries of the Father being heard by his Son, a young Man, who was but a little Way from the House, coming up to see what was the Matter, received a terrible Wound on the Cheek from the Negro, who would have dispatched the Son as well as the Father, had he not faved his Life by Flight. The Negro then went into his Master's House, and finding his Mistress had absconded, who, we make no Doubt he intended to dispatch, he armed himself, with his Ax and Knife, and took to the Woods, and we have not yet heard whether or no he has been taken.

On the 17th Inft. died after a tedious Illness, in the 35th Year of his Age, to the unspeakable Grief of his Friends, and the great Loss of the Public, the Revd. Robert M'Kean, M. A. Rector of Perth-Amboy, and Millionary from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel;—an unshaken Friend, an agreeable Companion, a rational Divine, a skilful Physician, and in every Relation of Life, a truly benevolent and honest Man.

The Sloop Dolphin, Capt. — in a Gale of Wind, in Lat. 39, Long. 72 lost her Bowspit Jib and Caboofe.

The Brigantine Squirrel of Yarmouth George Hellope Master, last from Bayonne; in Lat. 31, N. Long. 34, W. spoke with Capt. Ebenezer Turrel, of the Sloop Charming Sally, of and from New-York, bound to the River Gambio, all well.

In Lat. 28, N. Long. 58, W. spoke with Capt. John Ellis in the Ship Invincible, of and from Philadelphia, bound to Barbados.

Sunday the 18th Instant the House of Mr. Jofeph Cheesman, on the North Side of Hampstead Plains, was entirely confumed by Fire. The Neighbouring Men being all at Church, no Affiftance could be afforded to extinguish the Flames; however, the Women made thist to fafe some of the principal Furniture. This Accident was owing to a foul Chimney, which first took Fire, and immediately communicated to all the Building. It is furprifing that People will not be more careful to clean their Chimnies in Time, when so many Infances of Fire happen from foul Chimnies.




