On the twenty-fourth day of September
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and
thirty two, personally appeared in open Court before the Judge
of the County of Common Pleas in and for said County of Putnam
now living John Lake a resident of the Town of Pleasant
Valley in the County of Putnam and State of New York
of age seventy six years on the twenty sixth day
of August last past who being first duly sworn according
to Law, doth on his oath, make the following declaration
in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States
on or about the last of April or the first of May in the
year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and forty
eight as a substitute soldier for one Hiram Richardson
in a company of State Militia Soldiers under the command
of Captain Joseph Reynolds that at the time of his de-
cuiting the Army of the United States he resided in the town
of Wappinger in the County and State aforesaid and
was marched from thence to West Point on the West
Side of the Hudson River and was there employed at
labouring on the public fortifications until the expiration
of his stipulated term of service which amount
to the best of his recollection was some five
or six months.

That he again entered the said service
in the spring of seventeen hundred and forty nine, as a
clay substitute soldier in a company of State Militia
then commanded by Captain Woods. That his residence
was then the same as when he first entered the Army
and from thence he was marched with said Woods
company to Fishkill on the East Side of the Hudson
and from thence crossed the river into the County of
Orange and marched to the Minisink on the Delaware
River crossing said river into the State of Pennsylvania
and from thence marched to Lancaster and
from thence to Cashaway where they lay.

in temporary forts for a short time from which
forts they were marched to Oneida Cottonty Hollow
and from thence to a fort situated on the Leckawagon
river, and from thence they were marched almost im
mediately to the Cayuga or Seneca Lake in pursuit
of the Indians a few of whom they found and took a
small number, the main body of them having crossed
the lake before their arrival there - The object of
this expedition appears at the time to have been
for the two regiments of which said Woods Company
were a part to proceed towards the said Lakes and the
General Clinton Army which was a division of General
Sullivans army sent for the purpose of pursuing the
Indians. But on their arrival at the Lake they found
the whole body of men under the command of General
Clinton had crossed over the Lake some time before
their arrival whereupon they were immediately mar
ched back by nearly the same route to Stony point on
the West side of the Hudson and there remained enc
amped until late in the fall when they were marched
to Long Kapee in said Dutchess County and there and
there discharged after having been in service about
eight months, that the officers attached to said
regiment were Major Van Benschoten, and Colonel
Sabois, and the other officers he does not now recollect

That he again entered the service in the
spring of seventeen hundred and eighty, as
a step substitute soldier (so called) in Captain
Woods company. That Major Van Benschoten
and Colonel Westervelt were attached to the
Regiment of which his company formed a part.
that they were rendezvous at Long Kapee before
said army conducted from thence to Albany in
the state of New York by water and from thence
were marched to a place called Stone Arabia

commonly called Stone Robbie in said State
Where they were encamped under the British Army
consisting of two regiments of white people and
the remainder of Indians. Under the command
of Sir John Butler and Brant came there and attack
ed the army. The result of the battle was unfa
vorable to the American cause, and they were
compelled to retire within the fort. During this engage
ment Colonel Brown was killed - After the close
of the foregoing engagement the British Army retra
cted up the Mohawk River. The American
Army were soon reinforced by the arrival of a
body of Indians whom conduct of the retreating Army
was immediately made. They were followed for
several days during which time some provisions
were made prisoners. The present was sent thence as
far as the Cayuga Lake, where it was given up
and the Army returned back to Stone Arabia. com
monly called Stone Robbie, where they attended
the burial of Colonel Brown in the Holes of
War. They were then discharged after having
completed their term of service and had an
duty about five or six months - and after
being so discharged entered no more the service
of the United States as a soldier in the Army -
That he has no documentary evidence, but that
he knows of no person whose testimony he can
procure who can testify to his service. That he
was born in the said County of Dutchess on the twenty
sixth day of March one thousand seven hundred
and fifty six. That there was a record of his age
contained in his father's family Bible, but that at
present he does know where it is, or what has
become of it. That he has since the revolution
worn and now does live in the Town of Elias
in Valley in the said County of Dutchess. That he
does not know that he ever received a written
discharge from the service, but thinks he was

verbally discharged by the commanding officer
at the expiration of each term of service - That
he is known in his neighborhood by Stephen Ham,
Daniel J. Deane, Esq., & others, citizen, Governor to
Dennis Ward & sons, who are generally testify
as to his character for integrity and their belief
of his services as a soldier of the revolution.
That he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the present, and de-
clares that his name is not on the pension rolls of
the agency of any state.

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, S. 9924, it appears that John Lake was born March 26, 1756 in Dutchess County, New York.

While residing at Beekman, Dutchess County, New York, he enlisted April or May 1778 and served five months as a private in Captain Joseph Reynolds' Company, Colonel Lee's New York Regiment.

He enlisted in the spring of 1779 and served eight months as a private in Captain Woods' Company, Colonel DuBois' *New York Regiment*.

He enlisted in the spring of 1780 and served five months as a private in Captain Woods' Company, Colonel

Bostwick's New York Regiment and was in the battle of
Stone Arabia.

He was allowed pension on his application executed
September 24, 1832, while a resident of Pleasant Valley,
Dutchess County, New York.

There is no data on file as to his family.

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. REGULATIONS UNDER THE ACT OF JUNE 7, 1852.

The following regulations have been adopted:

This law has been construed to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Staff of the Army, and to include under the terms "Continental Line," "State Troops," "Militia," and volunteers. It did not include those who were enlisted, or who volunteered and who were bound to military service, but not those who were occasionally employed during a time upon civil contracts, such as Clerks to Commissioners and to Store Keepers, &c. Trimmers, Boatmen, &c., who were employed on board of private armed vessels are also excluded from the benefits of the law, as well as persons who turned out as patrols, or were engaged in guarding particular places at night, and were not recognized as being in actual military service.

- Four general classes of cases are embraced in this law:
1. The Regular Troops.
 2. The State Troops, Militia, and Volunteers.
 3. Persons employed in the Naval Service.
 4. Indian Spies.

As well of the regular troops in the Revolutionary War exist in this Department, all persons claiming the benefit of this law—officers, non-commissioned officers, musicians or privates, will, in the first instance, make application by transmitting the following declaration, which will be made before a Court of Record of the County where such applicant resides. And every Court having by law a seal and Clerk is considered a Court of Record.

This is the original discharge or commission, or any part of either of these can be obtained, the party will so state under oath, and will then procure, if possible, the testimony of at least one credible witness, stating in detail his personal knowledge of the services of the applicant, and such circumstances connected therewith, as may have a tendency to throw light upon the transaction.

If such surviving witness cannot be found, the applicant will so state in his declaration, (l) and he will also, whether he produce such evidence or not, proceed to relate all the material facts, which can be useful in the investigation of his claim, and in the comparison of his narrative with the events of the period of his
