for the purpose of having her name restored to the pension roll under the act of March 3, 1901, amending section 4708, Revised Statutes:—

That she was formerly pensioned as widow of Richard Lake,  
who died April 23, 1875, by reason of wound or injury received or disease contracted  
while serving as Private in Quinn Bell's Co. U. S. Cavalry  
of 1812. That she was his lawful wife during the period of his service in said war, and

That her pension was paid by the United States pension agent at Boston

That she is without other means of support than her daily labor and an actual net income not exceeding two

Boston, her true and lawful attorney to prosecute her claim (without fee).

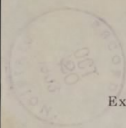

## UNDERTAKERS' DUTIES.

EXTRACTS FROM THE GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 100.

SECTION 9. No undertaker or other person shall conduct a funeral, or bury or deposit in a tomb, or remove from this State, or otherwise dispose of the remains of any deceased person, or still born child, **unless** he shall first obtain the physician's certificate required by section seven of this chapter, if a physician was in attendance upon such person who has deceased, or the person bringing forth such still born child, and shall return the same, together with his own certificate of the information required by section three of this chapter, to the town clerk of the town where such death or bringing forth took place. *Provided, however, that in such towns as allow the burial or removal of the bodies of deceased persons without a permit from the town clerk, and if the undertaker or other person who has charge of the disposal of the remains of the deceased person is unable to obtain the said physician's certificate after reasonable attempts therefor before the burial or removal of the said remains, then the said undertaker or other person shall make his return as required by section three of this chapter, including the cause of death and the name of the physician last in attendance upon the deceased, immediately to the town or city clerk or registrar of the town or city in which the death occurred. He shall also within two days thereafter notify the physician last in attendance upon the deceased person of the name and date of death of the same.* [Blanks for such notice to physicians can be obtained from town clerks and the State Registrar, upon application therefor.]

SEC. 13. Every clergyman, physician, midwife, undertaker, town clerk, clerk of any meeting of the Society of Friends, or other person who shall wilfully or unreasonably neglect or refuse to perform any of the duties imposed on or required of him by this chapter, shall be fined not exceeding twenty dollars, *nor less than two dollars* for each offence, one-half thereof to the use of the town in which the offence shall occur, and one-half thereof to the use of the person who shall complain of the same.

SEC. 14. Every clergyman, physician, coroner, undertaker, *medical examiner*, or clerk of any meeting of the Society of Friends, shall cause his name, residence, *and post office address* to be recorded in the town clerk's office of the town where he resides.

D. 1812, and that her said husband (14) died at Providence, Rhode Island, on the 1st day of January, A. D. 1812; and she further declares that the following have been the places of residence of herself and her said husband since the date of his discharge from the Army, viz: (15) Providence, Rhode Island.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the Pension to which she may be entitled under Sections 4736 to 4740, inclusive, Revised Statutes, and the Act of March 9, 1878, and hereby appoints John C. Lusk, her true and lawful attorney to prosecute her claim.

An Act To amend an Act entitled "An Act amending section forty-seven hundred and eight of the Revised Statutes of the United States, in relation to pensions to remarried widows," approved March third, nineteen hundred and one.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,* That section forty-seven hundred and eight of the laws of the United States governing the granting of army and navy pensions, be, and the same is, amended to read as follows:

"SEC. 4708. The remarriage of any widow, dependent mother, or dependent sister entitled to pension shall not bar her right to such pension to the date of her remarriage, whether an application therefor was filed before or after such marriage; but on the remarriage of any widow, dependent mother, or dependent sister having a pension such pension shall cease: *Provided, however,* That any widow who was the lawful wife of any officer or enlisted man or other person in the Army, Navy, or Marine Corps of the United States, as described in paragraphs one, two, and three of section forty-six hundred and ninety-three of the Revised Statutes of the United States, during the period of his service in any war, and whose name was placed or shall hereafter be placed on the pension roll because of her husband's death as the result of wound or injury received or disease contracted in such military or naval service, and whose name has been or shall hereafter be dropped from said pension roll by reason of her marriage to another person who has since died or shall hereafter die, or from whom she has been heretofore or shall be hereafter divorced, upon her own application and without fault on her part, and if she is without means of support other than her daily labor, as defined by the Acts of June twenty-seventh, eighteen hundred and ninety, and May ninth, nineteen hundred, shall be entitled to have her name again placed on the pension roll at the rate now provided for widows by the Acts of July fourteenth, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, March third, eighteen hundred and seventy-three, and March nineteenth, eighteen hundred and eighty-six, such pension to commence from the date of the filing of her application in the Pension Bureau after the approval of this Act: *And provided further,* That where such widow is already in receipt of a pension from the United States she shall not be entitled to restoration under this Act: *And provided further,* That where the pension of said widow on her second or subsequent marriage has accrued to a helpless or idiotic child, or a child or children under the age of sixteen years, she shall not be entitled to restoration under this Act unless said helpless or idiotic child, or child or children under sixteen years of age, be then a member or members of her family and cared for by her, and upon the restoration of said widow the payment of pension to said child or children shall cease."

SEC. 2. That the provisions of this Act shall be extended to those widows otherwise entitled whose husbands died of wounds, injuries, or disease contracted during the period of their military and naval



service, but who were deprived of pension under the Act of March third, eighteen hundred and sixty-five, because of their failure to draw any pension by reason of their remarriage.

SEC. 3. That no claim agent or other person shall be entitled to receive any compensation for services in making application for pension under this Act.

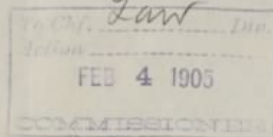

On this Eighteenth day of July, A.D. one thousand eight hundred and seventy, one, personally appeared before me, Henry Thomas Clark, a court of record within and for the county and State aforesaid, Richard Lake, aged 77 years, resident of East Providence county of Providence, State of Rhode Island, who being duly sworn according to law, declares that he is married, and that his wife's name was Julia Ann Cole, to whom he was married at Providence on the fifteenth day of September, 1876, that he served the full period of sixty days in military service of the United States in the war of 1812; that he is the identical Richard Lake who was captain of Light Artillery in John R. Bello's company, Regular Army, Second Robert's Detachment, Providence, R.I. on the fourth day of April, 1813, and was honorably discharged at Boston Mass. on the fourth day of April, 1814, at declaration of peace.

That he acted as one of a recruiting party after his enlistment, - at Prov. R.I. under Sergeant Benton and carried recruits to Bedford Mass. where Sent Robert's Detachment of Capt John R. Bello's Co. of L.A. was then quartered. That he subsequently joined his detachment at Bedford Mass. and was with them to Fort Providence Boston Harbor and so remained until declaration of peace.

that he, at no time during the late rebellion against the authority of the United States, rendered to the cause of the enemies of the Government, giving them aid or comfort, or exercise the functions of any office whatever under any authority, or pretended authority, in hostility to the United States; and that he will support the Constitution of the United States; that he is not in receipt of a pension under any previous act; that he makes this declaration for the purpose of being placed on the pension roll of the United States, under the provisions of the act approved February 14, 1871, and he hereby constitutes and appoints, with full power of substitution and revocation, JAMES R. READ, of Warwick, R. I. his true and lawful attorney, to prosecute his claim and obtain the pension certificate that may be issued; that his office is at Natchemset county of Providence, State of Rhode Island; that his domicile or place of abode is East Providence - Prov Co - Rhode Island.
